Lately, the Extended Education folks have been "training the trainers" on how to use TCU's Zoom platform.

Be aware: It is best if we don't drop in at Secrest-Wible for a visit with Extended Ed staff. They can handle everything we need over the phone and via email. This is for your protection, as well as for the health and safety of the students, faculty and staff. The one exception is instructors who need to teach class from the conference room (arranged in advance). For social distancing, much of the non-classroom space on campus has been repurposed for in-person instruction. The Campus Rec is closed to community members and alumni. The library is closed to the public.

I'm glad you have chosen to join Silver Frogs in this troubling time. I hope you'll stay and hang in there while we explore this new way of online learning. I know you will find Silver Frogs to be a fun group. We will not only learn together, but also be able to check in with each other and look after each other, re-connect with friends, and make new friends. Be safe! Stay at home! Wear your mask! Wash your hands! See you in school!

FALL 2020: SILVER FROGS BY THE NUMBERS

This was our second semester for Silver Frog members to utilize the "new" system for course requests and allocation, and once again the process went very smoothly! The numbers are impressive:

- Fall 2020 membership: 574 (54 new!) that's even more than we had in Fall 2019!
- 2,273 individual course/lecture registrations processed on Allocation Day, August 24
- **92%** of members participated in the allocation process
- Of 77 available courses/lectures:
 - \Rightarrow **33** courses/lectures were filled to capacity on Allocation Day
 - \Rightarrow 15 additional courses/lectures were filled after a week of open registration
 - \Rightarrow **29** courses/lectures remain open (551 seats)

We thank TCU's Extended Ed and IT departments for making it all run smoothly!

GETTING READY FOR SCHOOL TO START

You've registered for classes and you still have a few days before Session I starts. Now's the time to get yourself ready for the new semester, with no worries about forgetting your locker combination or cramming for exams.

STEP 1: Get everything into your calendar.

Whether you use a date book, desk calendar or an electronic schedule, take a few minutes to synch your new classes with your calendar and (if it helps you) set reminders so you don't forget any of your upcoming activities. Occasionally there are classes scheduled at the same time, so make sure you aren't trying to be virtually in two places at once.

STEP 2: Make adjustments. If you signed up for a course or lecture and later realize that you won't be able to make it for any reason, it's no big deal. **Simply contact the Extended Ed office at 817-257-7132** as soon as you know, so that you can be withdrawn from the class. This opens up the seat for another member to attend the course.

This is especially important for one-time lectures, but it may also be a good option if you find you'll miss multiple sessions of a four-week course. Many courses are offered again in another semester, and you're likely to get more out of any course when you're able to attend most of its sessions. The same courtesy applies to other Silver Frogs events. In most cases there are a limited number of spaces; if you sign up and later find you can't attend, just let Extended Ed know.

STEP 3: Learn! If you're a note-taker, have paper and pen handy when you sign in to your class. Not all courses have handouts, but many will, and you'll see those ahead of time in your email. If you choose to print those, you may find it helpful to designate a folder or small binder for organizing your materials.

STEP 4: Provide feedback. After the completion of each class, you'll get an email survey requesting your comments about it. Please take a couple of minutes to respond and provide this helpful information to the Curriculum Committee.

FINALLY — and this is important — if you have NOT registered for a class or event, you may not attend. Please **do not share your Zoom link with others**, as there are a limited number of spaces in the class and they are reserved for those who are registered.

You'll get a confirmation message every time you sign up for something, so you'll know for sure that you're "in"! Extended Ed also sends email reminders before each class begins; be sure to read those in case anything changes about your class.



ZOOM-ZOOM! HERE WE GO ...

If you haven't become Zoom-proficient over the summer, you don't need to worry! We know people who Zoom all the time, and one of those is our own Julie Lovett, who shares some helpful hints for us before classes begin:



Above all else, stay healthy and safe. We're looking forward to seeing everyone in person as soon as possible! — Julie

- If you're having connection issues, try turning your video off.
- To hear better, use headphones/earbuds and turn up your speaker volume.
- Zoom invitations will typically be emailed two business days in advance of a class. If you're in a four-week class, keep the email so you can use the link again.
- Please do not share your Zoom invitation with others. We have courses capped for effectiveness and we'll be taking attendance!
- You will be "muted" upon arrival in class. Stay muted until you have a question. You can unmute yourself by holding down your space bar while talking and then release to easily return to the muted mode.
- Handouts will be emailed prior to the start of classes.
- Give a lot of grace and thanks to your instructors—we couldn't have programs without them and this is our first time doing programs remotely!

INSTRUCTOR SPOTLIGHT: LALONNIE LEHMAN

TCU Professor LaLonnie Lehman will be conducting only her second lecture for Silver Frogs this semester, but you may have benefitted—probably without knowing it—from her remarkable skills in other venues around Fort Worth.

First and foremost, LaLonnie has been teaching in the areas of costume history, costume design and costume construction in TCU's College of Fine Arts, Theatre Department, since 1972. Since that time, she has taught 13 different courses and designed costumes for well over 300 TCU and other theater productions.

Midway into the spring 2020 semester, she was among TCU's pioneers in conducting her classes virtually, one student as far away as Japan where her class time began at 1:00am. All her fall classes are being taught virtually from her home in the TCU area, which abounds in theater memorabilia. "I'd rather be standing in front of a classroom full of students," she laments. "That's how teachers feel they are at their best."

In the early 1980s, the Fort Worth Opera learned of her skills and invited her to become the costume designer for the children's opera and costume coordinator for the "big opera." There, she turns two-dimensional designs on paper/ computer into three-dimensional costumes that become part of the opera story-telling process.

In a recent YouTube video interview with the FWO, LaLonnie explains how "your costumes define both the mood and the personality of a character and a scene. Costumes are one of the visual delights of the opera. The designer's mission is to create costumes for a character that help the singer tell the story both to themselves and to the audience."

She recalls with delight the transformation that takes place when an actor puts on their costume, stage makeup and oftentimes a wig. "They look in the mirror and they suddenly BECOME that character. It's transformative."

"One of the most outstanding things for me is watching the children in the audience at a final dress rehearsal of the Opera at Bass Hall," she says. "Those students cheer and clap and are so appreciative. The same thing happens at the schools before the children's operas where many have never seen a live performance before." And, in another venue, this costume historian was in the core group that 45 years ago conceived of and brought to fruition at University Christian Church the annual Boar's Head and Yule Log



Festival. It's an elaborate production of more than 300 actors, singers, and musicians – most requiring unique costumes. It's considered by many to be a highlight of the community Christmas season.

The Boar's Head production is the subject of her book entitled **The Boar's Head Festival: A Christmas Celebration** which was published by TCU Press in 2015. Prior to that, she wrote **Fashion in the Time of the Great Gatsby** (Shire Publications, England), some of which she will be sharing in the SF lecture October 23. Her latest publication is a textbook, **High Definition Stage Makeup**, published in 2018.

Her SF lecture draws on her knowledge of how the confluence of the youth, women's and civil rights movements, and the Vietnam War changed American society. This cultural shift can be seen in our music, art, clothing, film, national incidents, manners, sexuality, and books. Her PowerPoint abounds in illustrations of the cultural changes following WWII, with a special focus on the 1960s.

Although much of her work is behind the scenes, it's not without notice. She is the recipient of the Educator of the Year and Lifetime Achievement Awards from the Live Theater League of Fort Worth, the Founders Award for Outstanding Lifetime Service by the US Institute for Theatre Technology/SW, and is a TCU Mortar Board Preferred Professor. She earned her BA and MA degrees at TCU.
