

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Meet & Greet Kicks Off the New Semester

On Wednesday, September 1, over 60 Silver Frogs members and Extended Ed staffers met via Zoom to officially kick off Fall21. A lot of useful information was shared, and there was also just enough time for a couple of breakout sessions where we could meet some new friends and chat for a few minutes, while seeing each other in a safe, mask-free way.



Highlights from the call (and not included elsewhere in this newsletter) included:

- ◆ **Advisory Board President Siân Borne** welcomed members and introduced the board members and committee chairs
- ◆ **Curriculum Committee Chair Randy Smith** thanked all of our volunteer Instructors and gave an overview of this semester's offerings along with a description of how his committee works; he is looking to add some new members and can be reached at smithrc@flash.net. He also reminded everyone to start thinking about what they might teach next spring!
- ◆ **Special Events Chair Susan Turner** reported on the activities survey that went out in August. She was thrilled at the response and all the new ideas, and she gained 27 committee members! A meeting will be set up soon. She talked about several events in the works, most of which will have an outdoor component. These include the Fort Worth Zoo, Amon Carter Museum, Botanic Garden, possible athletic and fine arts events at TCU, and a couple of holiday activities.
- ◆ **TCU Liaison Julie Lovett** reviewed campus policies related to COVID-19. For us this means masking any time we are indoors on campus—put your mask on before entering! Instructors can opt for a face shield and will stay at the front of the room. No eating or drinking in class. And please do NOT come to campus if you have any symptoms. Call to cancel out of any class you cannot attend; we are tracking who is in each class for contact tracing purposes, if needed. Notify Extended Ed if you attend an in-person class and develop symptoms within 48 hours. Keep an eye on your email—in the event of any changes, you'll have information there. Make sure your TCU email isn't going into the spam folder!



Meet Our Silver Stars!

Silver Frogs launched its first semester in Spring 2015 with 160 members who enjoyed 24 course offerings. This semester marks the 14th for the program and we're recognizing and honoring the **62** charter members—39% of the original group—who have returned for more this fall. Fall 2021: Silver Frogs by the Numbers

As we open Silver Frogs' 14th semester, here's how things stack up:

- Fall 2021 membership: **600** (**100** new!) with a waitlist for Spring
 - ⇒ **71%** female, **29%** male
 - ⇒ Ages ranging from **53** to **93** years young!
- **86%** of members (518) participated in the allocation process
- Of **107** offered courses/lectures:
 - ⇒ **68%** will be in-person and **32%** via Zoom (instructors' choice)
 - ⇒ **49%** of courses/lectures were filled to capacity after initial requests processed
 - ⇒ **71%** of courses/lectures were filled after a week of open registration
 - ⇒ **2765** total seats originally available, **2365** seats taken (86% of capacity)
 - ⇒ **28** courses/lectures remain open as of September 1 (400 seats); you can still register for these at your convenience



We thank TCU's Extended Ed and IT departments for making it all run smoothly!

Our freshman class members have a distinctive little frog printed on their name badges, which you will see if you meet them at an in-person class. Be sure to help them feel welcome and comfortable!

You're probably getting used to watching your email for communications from TCU; but keep an eye on your other mailbox too, because Extended Ed is mailing your magnetic name badge, dashboard parking pass, and other information to your home—including a coupon for Silver Frogs swag (a gift!) that you can redeem at Secrest-Wible. We usually distribute this packet at the in-person Meet & Greet, but that doesn't work when we're Zooming!



Go Where Everybody Knows Your Name

Be sure to wear your new magnetic Silver Frog name badge to all in-person classes and events associated with Silver Frogs. You'll see right away why we do this — it's so much easier to talk to each other and remember names with that visual cue, especially when we are wearing masks. The badge helps our classroom hosts sign you in to your classes. When we are at other venues it makes us easy to identify.

Just keep the badge in your car, your purse, or with something you always carry when you're heading to TCU!

One other note: if your tag says "James" but you normally go by "Jimmy," you don't have to use a Sharpie to write your preferred name on it! Just call or stop by the Extended Ed office in Secrest-Wible and ask them to print another tag for you. You can also update your name in your account online, so that next time your badge will come out just the way you like.



Are You Ready for School to Start?

You've registered for classes and you still have a few days before Session I starts. Now's the time to get yourself ready for the new semester with no worries about forgetting your locker combination or cramming for exams.

STEP 1: Get everything into your calendar.

Whether you use a date book, desk calendar or an electronic schedule, take a few minutes to sync your new classes with your calendar and (if it helps you) set reminders so you don't forget any of your upcoming activities. Occasionally there are classes scheduled at the same time, so make sure you aren't trying to be in two places at once.

STEP 2: Make adjustments. If you signed up for a course or lecture and later realize that you won't be able to make it for any reason, it's no big deal. **Simply contact the Extended Ed office at 817-257-7132** as soon as you know, so that you can be withdrawn from the class. This opens up the seat for another member to attend the course.

This is especially important for one-time lectures, but it may also be a good option if you find you'll miss multiple sessions of a four-week course. Many courses are offered again in another semester, and you're likely to get more out of any course when you're able to attend most of it.

The same courtesy applies to other Silver Frogs events. In most cases there are a limited number of spaces; if you sign up and later find you can't attend, just let Extended Ed know.

STEP 3: Learn! If you're a note-taker, have paper and pen handy when you walk in or sign in to your class. Not all courses have handouts, but many will, and you'll either get a printed copy (in-person) or see those in your email (virtual). You may find it helpful to designate a folder in your computer or utilize a small binder for organizing your paper materials.

STEP 4: Provide feedback. After the completion of each class, you'll get an email survey requesting your comments about it. Please take a couple of minutes to respond and provide this helpful information to the Curriculum Committee.

FINALLY — and this is important — if you have NOT registered for a class or event, you may NOT attend. Please **do not share your Zoom link with others**, and **do not attempt to attend an in-person class you are not registered for**, as there are a limited number of spaces in the class and they are reserved for those who are registered. The classroom capacity is strictly limited and for contact-tracing purposes we will be keeping a record of who attends.

You'll get a confirmation message every time you sign up for something, so you'll know for sure that you're "in"! Extended Ed also sends email reminders before the first session of each class; be sure to read those in case anything changes about your class.





Taking Some Virtual Classes?

By now, most of us have Zoomed a few times and we are much better at it than we were in the beginning. But even the most experienced virtual learners can use a few reminders as we get back to class.

- **One of the most challenging things your Zoom instructor has to deal with is interruptions from background noise.** Maybe you've been in a class where this has happened — the instructor is lecturing and all of a sudden someone is talking about what they are having for lunch! Or worse, commenting on the class without realizing everyone can hear it (and see who they are as their "box" lights up on screen). You will be "muted" upon arrival in class. PLEASE stay muted until you have a question. You can unmute yourself by holding down your space bar while talking and then release to easily return to the muted mode — that way you won't forget to re-mute.
- **The link to your virtual class** will typically be emailed two business days in advance of the first meeting. If you're in a four-week class, keep the email so you can use the link again. Please do NOT share your Zoom invitation with others. We have course capacities capped for effectiveness and we'll be taking attendance!
- **Handouts** will be emailed prior to the start of classes.
- **When you log into Zoom**, you will appear on-screen (with or without video, your choice) and your name will display. If your screen is showing your daughter's name because you are using her iPad, or it just says "iPhone," please take a moment to right-click your name and "Rename" to change it.
- **If you're having connection issues**, try turning your video off. Otherwise, please show your face! Your instructors love to see you.
- **To hear better**, use headphones/earbuds and turn up your speaker volume.
- Give a lot of grace and **thanks to your instructors**—we couldn't have virtual programs without their willingness to brave the technical challenge!


This can in the Secret-Wible classroom collects travel-sized toiletries for donation to the Presbyterian Night Shelter and Safe Haven.



A LEGACY OF LEARNING: Dr. Ron Flowers and Ann Heinz

In June, Silver Frogs lost two of our longest-term leaders and avid lifelong learners, Dr. Ron Flowers and Ann Heinz. While words cannot adequately express how much we will miss sharing time with them in the classroom or a museum, their energy and enthusiasm will stay with each of us who was able to do so. Happily, they were generous with their time and ideas, and each in his/her own way helped guide the Silver Frogs program into 2021.

Charter member **Dr. Ron Flowers** taught Silver Frogs 35 popular courses and lectures – with over 1300 registrations – during the 12 semesters he volunteered his time. His dedication to teaching led him to present three of those classes in our first virtual semester, bravely leaping into Zoom even though it was uncomfortable territory.

A retired professor of religion, most of Ron's courses delved into the boundless topics around religious beliefs, and while he shared his specialty of Church and State he also taught more unusual subjects including his *And They Shall Take Up Serpents* lecture. Always professional in his shirt and tie, he delighted in answering student questions and recommending additional reading. His enthusiasm for teaching was evident, and his wit very much appreciated by his "elder" students at Silver Frogs.

He was always generous and willing to help out in other areas when asked, contributing to the Silver Streak and even serving as a distinguished judge in our 2019 Cookie Challenge. He didn't even hesitate on that one!

As a teacher, fearless lifelong learner and a true gentleman, Dr. Flowers was an inspiration to so many. He set high standards for his own classes, reminding students how important it is to think for ourselves and ask questions, in turn helping make Silver Frogs what it is today.

Dr. Flowers was a “regular” in our office area. He would come and visit with staff upfront or me in my office all the time. He had a habit of getting ready to leave only to sit back down and talk about something else. A five-minute visit would turn into 30 and I loved every minute of it. We were fortunate that Ron came to see us the day before his last surgery. He talked about his fall classes (and he still had a lot of work to do), what he wanted to teach for the Silver Frogs in Spring 2022, and how much he loved teaching to the Frogs. He mentioned to me on more than one occasion that he saw teaching the Silver Frogs as one of his purposes in life. I truly believe we all meant as much to him as he to us. It was a privilege to know him.
