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To Mask, or Not To Mask?



That is the question, now that TCU has lifted the indoor masking requirement. Your instructors now have the option for their in-person classes to be either "mask optional" or "mask required" — you will be notified if a class you've signed up for will require a mask covering your nose and mouth.

And if the unmasking causes you to rethink coming to an in-person class, just contact Extended Ed and let them know you won't be attending, so they can open up your seat to someone else.

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When You're Registered for a Class, Whether In Person or Online...

...please attend. And if you can't, please take a moment to notify the Extended Ed office as soon as you know you won't be there. We all have last-minute things that come up, preventing us from getting to class, which is perfectly understandable (and unpreventable). But if you find a schedule conflict in advance of your class, we ask that you call 817-257-7132 and cancel — there may be other members on the waitlist for class, and this lets Extended Ed fill your empty seat.

Remember: whether the class is large or small, your instructor has spent time preparing the materials and his or her presentation. Some classes have group activities or supplies that the instructor has planned based on the roster. It does make a difference when 30% of the students don't show up (that isn't an exaggeration — it has happened on multiple occasions). So be considerate of them and your classmates! Next time you get an email that you've been added to a class from the waitlist, you'll know someone called and gave up their seat. It's the right thing to do.



What Will You Teach Next Fall?

Have you considered becoming a volunteer instructor? Teaching credentials are not required (although we love that). What you need is a passion for your subject and a willingness to share it. Fear not! If creating a PowerPoint presentation or handout isn't your forte, we have help available. New, more in depth instructor training opportunities were offered this semester and will continue for the fall.

Longtime Silver Frogs are always looking for new courses to take, but we have a lot of newer members as well, and so previously-offered classes are welcome. If you've taught before and skipped a few semesters, come on back!

Be creative and have fun with your class idea. There are many different ways to structure a class: include a field trip relevant to your subject, or assign a book to read or a video to watch in advance for group discussion. Think about clever activities to inspire students to learn more. Team-teach with a friend.

Another way we can help guarantee that there are always new courses and lectures offered is to recruit our talented friends—whether or not they are members—to become volunteer instructors. They don't even have to live in our area, since we offer online courses. So call your sister, your neighbor, or anyone else you know whose expertise you admire...maybe they would enjoy sharing their passion with us!

Proposals will be accepted until April 11. Instructors have two formats to choose from: in-person programs presented on campus in our Secrest-Wible classroom or programs delivered via Zoom. No preference? Please indicate that on the proposal form. Flexibility is greatly appreciated! The committee can also schedule multiple sections of your course throughout the semester—just indicate that option when you make your proposal.

On Twosday (2/2/22), Silver Frogs met via Zoom for our 4th (and hopefully last!) virtual Meet & Greet. While we certainly would have preferred to meet in person, it was great to see over 75 attendees on our screens, ready to start the new semester!

Julie Lovett shared some spring-semester stats: 541 members (60 are new), putting the program at 90% of its maximum capacity; 71% female, 29% male; our most seasoned member is 93 and our youngest is 53. She talked about what's going on with TCU, including a continued mask mandate* for indoor events; no large group programs will be scheduled. Silver Frogs has a good mix of in-person and virtual classes. Julie reviewed some tips for successful Zoom learning as well as waitlist and classroom host information. Packets are available in the Extended Ed office; be sure to display the parking pass on your dashboard (also available online) whenever you park in a TCU lot. Wear your name badge whenever you attend a class or event in person. She also announced that Silver Frogs "swag" is available for sale online, while it lasts.

President Siân Borne introduced the Advisory Board and also talked about our Special Interest Groups.

We will next meet again in April.


