Class sizes have been increased this semester in both classrooms that we will be using. Also, you probably noticed that we have increased the number of classes you could initially request from six to eight. There are still a few virtual classes as well. Our curriculum committee has worked tirelessly through the summer to get a full schedule of classes with many new and interesting offerings.

Fall 2022: Silver Frogs by the Numbers


As we open Silver Frogs' **16**th semester, here's how things stack up:

- Fall 2022 membership: 558 (64 new!), 93% of capacity
 - \Rightarrow 72% female, 28% male
 - \Rightarrow Ages ranging from 50 to 92
- 85% of members (474) participated in the allocation process
- Of 119 offered courses/lectures:
 - \Rightarrow 92% will be in-person and 8% via Zoom (instructors' choice)
 - ⇒ 39% of courses/lectures were filled to capacity after initial requests processed
 - \Rightarrow 3716 total seats originally available, 2917 seats taken (78% of capacity)
 - \Rightarrow **70** courses/lectures remain open as of August 29 (**789** seats); you can still register for these at your convenience

Big thanks to our Curriculum Committee for compiling a fantastic selection of classes, and to TCU's Extended Ed and IT departments for making it all run smoothly!

Fall is always a busy time of year, inside and outside of Silver Frogs. As you plan for the months ahead, you may find <u>this listing of Silver</u> <u>Frogs activities</u> handy to either print out and stick to the fridge, or to use for entering important dates into your day planner or digital calendar.

Go Where Everybody Knows Your Name

Be sure to wear your Silver Frogs name badge (find it in your membership packet) to all in-person classes and events associated with Silver Frogs. You'll see right away why we do this—it's so much easier to talk to each other and remember names with that visual cue. The badge helps our classroom hosts sign you in to your classes. When we are at other venues it makes us easy to identify.

Just keep the badge in your car, your purse, or with something you always carry when you're heading to TCU!

One other note: if your tag says "James" but you normally go by "Jimmy," you don't have to use a Sharpie to write your preferred name on it! Just call or stop by the Extended Ed office in Secrest-Wible and ask them to print another tag for you. You can also update your name in your account online, so that next time your badge will come out just the way you like.



Are You Ready for School to Start?

You've registered for classes and you still have a few days before Session I starts. Now's the time to get yourself ready for the new semester with no worries about forgetting your locker combination or cramming for exams.

STEP 1: Get everything into your calendar.

Whether you use a date book, desk calendar or an electronic schedule, take a few minutes to sync your new classes with your calendar and (if it helps you) set reminders so you don't forget any of your upcoming activities. Occasionally there are classes scheduled at the same time, so make sure you aren't trying to be in two places at once.

STEP 2: Make adjustments. If you signed up for a course or lecture and later realize that you won't be able to make it for any reason, it's no big deal. **Simply contact the Extended Ed office at 817-257-7132** as soon as you know, so that you can be withdrawn from the class. This opens up the seat for another member to attend the course.

This is especially important for one-time lectures, but it may also be a good option if you find you'll miss multiple sessions of a four-week course. Many courses are offered again in another semester, and you're likely to get more out of any course when you're able to attend most of it.

The same courtesy applies to other Silver Frogs events. In most cases there are a limited number of spaces; if you sign up and later find you can't attend, just let Extended Ed know. **STEP 3: Learn!** If you're a note-taker, have paper and pen handy when you walk in or sign in to your class. Not all courses have handouts, but many will, and you'll either get a printed copy (in-person) or see those in your email (virtual). You may find it helpful to designate a folder in your computer or utilize a small binder for organizing your paper materials.

STEP 4: Provide feedback. After the completion of each class, you'll get an email survey requesting your (anonymous) comments about it. Please take a couple of minutes to respond and provide this helpful information to the Curriculum Committee.

FINALLY — and this is important — if you have NOT registered for a class or event, you may NOT attend. Please **do not share your Zoom link with others**, and **do not attempt to attend an in-person class you are not registered for**, as there are a limited number of spaces in the class and they are reserved for those who are registered. <u>The</u> <u>classroom capacity is strictly limited and for</u> <u>contact-tracing purposes we will be keeping a</u> <u>record of who attends</u>.

You'll get a confirmation message every time you sign up for something, so you'll know for sure that you're "in"! Extended Ed also sends email reminders before the first session of each class; be sure to read those in case anything changes about your class.

Taking a Virtual Class?

By now, most of us have Zoomed a few times and we are much better at it than we were in the beginning. But even the most experienced virtual learners can use a few reminders as we get back to class.

- The link to your virtual class will typically be emailed two business days in advance of the first meeting. If you're in a four-week class, keep the email so you can use the link again. Please do NOT share your Zoom invitation with others. We have course capacities capped for effectiveness and we'll be taking attendance!
- Handouts will be emailed prior to the start of classes.
- When you log into Zoom, you will appear on-screen (with or without video, your choice) and your name will display. If your screen is showing your daughter's name because you are using her iPad, or it just says "iPhone," please take a moment to right-click your name and "Rename" to change it.
- If you're having connection issues, try turning your video off. Otherwise, please show your face! Your instructors love to see you.
- To hear better, use headphones/earbuds and turn up your speaker volume.
- One of the most challenging things your Zoom instructor has to deal with is interruptions from background noise. Maybe you've been in a class where this has happened—the instructor is lecturing and all of a sudden someone is talking about what they are having for lunch! Or worse, commenting on the class without realizing everyone can hear it (and see who they are as their "box" lights up on screen). You will be "muted" upon arrival in class. PLEASE stay muted until you have a question. You can unmute yourself on a computer by holding down your space bar while talking and then releasing it to easily return to the muted mode—that way you won't forget to remute. On a tablet or phone, click the microphone icon to mute and unmute.
- **Be willing to participate** by sharing your experience or asking questions. Your instructors like to know you're paying attention and engaged with the material, even if they can't see you.
- Be courteous and attentive to your instructors—we couldn't have virtual programs without their willingness to brave the technical challenge! There's a lot to manage; giving the presentation is just one part of it. They might be checking the chat, changing cameras, operating a PowerPoint or even wielding a spatula while they're talking.



Just for Instructors


Our instructors are the backbone of the Silver Frogs program; if you're considering sharing what you know by becoming an instructor, you should know that there's plenty of support available from Extended Ed AND your fellow instructors.

Already this semester, interested instructors attended a class on advanced PowerPoint techniques, led by Advisory Board president and frequent instructor Jim Godfrey. And prior to the start of each four-week session, the instructors for that session have an opportunity to attend an Instructor Overview session to help answer their questions prior to teaching. Upon request, assistance is available with presentation and handout preparation as well.

Most classes will have a classroom host to assist with administrative things (like signing people in, adjusting the lights, and fetching help from the office if needed). In addition, experienced instructors are always willing to help each other out - we've all had a "first time" standing at the front of the room!

Plan Your Parking

Silver Frogs activities occur in three different campus locations: Dee J. Kelly Alumni & Visitors Center, Brown-Lupton University Union (BLUU), and Secrest-Wible (Extended Ed). Your parking pass allows you to park in various lots on campus designated CM/FS; be sure to display the pass on your dashboard while parking on campus. 
KELLY CENTER AND BLUU:

The street at the top of this map is Cantey; the one running from top to bottom is Stadium Drive. For events in the **Kelly Center** and **BLUU**, you can park in Lot 6, Frog Alley parking garage, or Lot 3 (directly west of the garage).

SECREST-WIBLE:

This section of the map is bordered by W Lowden Street at the top (north), Forest Park Boulevard on the right (east), W Berry Street at the bottom (south) and Cockrell Avenue on the left (west). The lots with the purple arrows are your closest/target parking areas!
